

I'm Eviers D. Innocent, I'm from Haiti originally, I lived there in my early childhood and I moved here around 2nd grade. I've always lived in yonkers since I moved to America. In the past 3 years, I started getting involved in making clothes, I started deconstructing and that's how I learned the basics of making clothes. I went to school for a bit and now im here. Esten is just me trying to save something that is going away in terms of fit and integrity and clothing is not really made for the specific person it's more mass-marketed. I feel like it's not impossible to get something that's like done for yourself but a lot of people in this generation don't know how to go about finding that because most places are deep and for the most part there are older people that the younger customer may not necessarily feel comfortable talking to. Im a young person so, young people want unique things they want custom things that are sized to them, they want to put graphics and motifs that relate to them and I feel like that's just what Esten is, me trying to save that and not have that go away.

When did you realize that you wanted to start a business and actually get into the fashion industry and do your own pieces?

I would say after my second semester, I didn't know I wanted to start a business but I knew I wanted to make clothes for people. At first, I wasn't really charging anyone, first of all, I didn't have the skill level to charge anyone like that so I made clothes for my friends and people that were okay with experimenting with me. Most of the clothes I make now are still free for my friends and of course myself.

What's your future looking like fashion wise?

In 5-10 years I definitely want at least two established studios in an established location people can easily get to in a business setting. One studio out here, one studio outside of America. Right now everything is a little makeshift as you can see but it's cool.

How do you manage your time between working on your craft, your social life, and your compensation?

It's wild, I work two jobs now. But even before like whenever my friends are here and we're just hanging out I'll just be on the side working. I be chilling I'll watch a movie whenever I feel like watching a movie, listen to music, etc. I have the liberty to do that now that im not too large so I take advantage of it.

I noticed some music in the background, is there any type of specific music that you listen to when you're about to start sewing or do anything just to get you motivated and get going?

I listen to jazz, specifically Lionel Hampton, RIP, and I also listen to a lot of post-punk and a lot of mid-2000s alternative and I also listen to modern-day underground rap and like trendy shit. Mostly its jazz and post-punk when im getting into strict concentration. Specifically The Cure, Shoutouts The Cure I fuck with The Cure heavy.

Do you ever think about collaborating with other artists?


Yes, I have, I actually did a few collabs. The pintuck iguana jeans were hand-painted by my friend Daniella and constructed by me. A lot of my collaborations are more for utility than they are for design. I have a friend Max, he does embroidery for people we created the cloud sweater, he embroidered that and I designed it. He helped me with the text and everything for that placement. I feel like it's impossible to do anything without collaboration even if you goto the store and buy a piece of fabric somebody still made that fabric, I don't know how to make fabric, I don't know how to weave so yeah those are some of the artists.

Who or what inspires your artistry?

I think I'm inspired by everything, for me personally I don't have a strict process that I follow or a certain way that I do things every time. It's a little more organic. If I see something random, hear a song or if I feel a certain type of way, all of that is translated into clothing that I'm designing but also when I'm designing a piece for someone they're always the inspiration, whether its a character trait or physical trait im trying to have shown more those are the things I pay attention to. Other than that nothing really inspires me.

The pressure of being creative is always up so how well do you cope with deadlines and the showing of new designs?

Showing of new designs I feel is completely up to me like I don't have deadlines for that but with clients, its a little harder especially when a lot of my clients are accustomed to sitting through fittings and waiting weeks for their clothes so it's kinda hard convincing them but it usually just goes through. The hardest part is the second and third fittings. Let's say there's something still wrong and we're at three fittings already and it can be better and some people don't wanna stretch it that long so a lot of times there's some compromise that's done in terms of fit and certain design elements that could've been better.

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

How would you describe your style in three words?



What does the fashion and photography industry need more of? Less of?

You reach out to brands and hit them up saying "who's this?" and then they look at the page and they're like okay like now I understand the dynamic that we're speaking of So, I think it kind of allows me in the room to speak to certain brands and kind of establish a connection and actually I think the followers allows me access to be an influencer and work with other people who brands wouldn't see because their following isn't there yet. I work with the same people usually and their followers mean to a lot to me as far as content so I think in the same way it's allowed me to elevate myself and help connect people who may not be seen because they're following dictates that they shouldn't be when their quality of content is usually screaming they should be in the same room.



What brand or brands inspires and motivates you to be yourself? Do you have any?

No, not really because I don't really mainstream shop for clothes like I don't shop in the mall anymore, I usually either thrift or wear clothes that are sent to me. Mostly, blackowned brands, just stores where I've met the people online, one-on-one's, and local brands. There are no big brands that I really use at this stage. It's a lot of different things, there's really no one big brand that I look up to for inspiration.
