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
#### EDITORS NOTE





#### What was it like growing up in Boston? How's the fashion



I have another Instagram page called @bhrissys which is basically bhrissys closet. No bullshit when everybody come to my crib the first thing that they do is try to see where my clothes are at. So, I directed and styled all my shoots and I style my homies. I even directed one of my videos that im about to drop for a few songs that I made. 


# THE HISTORY AND EMERGENCE OF THE SNEAKER

Footwear is "the captured image" when it comes to the essence of a fit. Imagine a woman in a Hermès long coat suit in off-white wool piqué with an inlaid collar – creating a flawless drape and a summer silhouette with black Saint Laurent opium sandals or Dior B23'S, and a stunning cashmere/silk Loro Piana scarf wrapped around her neck. When an individual with apparent style catches the eye, you often take note of the designer accessories or the overall look, but nowadays fashion-lovers into urban style will gravitate towards the footwear.

Do you ever wonder why we look for and crave the latest best thing? Celebrities are, arguably, the best influencers as to why we give up our paychecks for those fresh and fire pair of kicks. Celebrities such as A\$AP Rocky, Travis Scott, Pharrell Williams, PJ Tucker, and Kanye West all contribute to the mass marketing of kicks and setting trends in the fashion industry. It sparks discussion regarding the clothing/particular fit that day, how the sneaker looks, how they look, how it would make you look, etc. Essentially, sneakers are a way for people to establish a form of superiority and statement. Since the invention of the sneaker in the 19th century, it has been about much more than athletics; but merely the expression of ideas about national identity, class, race, and other forms of social meaning. Have you ever wondered how sneakers came to be?






The story of "sneaker culture," goes far beyond pairing the perfect Nikes with a little black dress. The sneaker, in its most basic sense, is much older than you might think. Rubber-soled shoes existed as far back as the late 18th century. However, these early versions of what we would later come to know as the sneaker would be barely recognizable to us today. Dubbed "plimsolls," these shoes were about as basic as you can get; the design did not even include a discernible right or left foot. It was not until Charles Goodyear created vulcanized rubber in the 1800's that the potential for a rubber sole was seriously considered. Shoes featuring vulcanized rubber soles, it was discovered, were perfect for athletic wear: the first pair was created for use in croquet, quickly expanding into other sports.


The first sneakers mass-produced in the US were Keds. They were marketed as a streamlined, basic shoe featuring a rubber sole that would hold up far better than a leather one in athletics. The Massachusetts-based shoe company Converse quickly followed suit. In 1917, they released the "All-Star" basketball shoes. This was the world's first high top: the canvas was cut in such a way that it covered the ankle to provide support, while remaining lightweight and allowing the wearer grip. In the 1920's, basketball player Chuck Taylor lent his athletic experience to the design process of his eponymous Converse shoe. This design has remained almost completely unchanged for nearly a century and is still extremely popular today as a leisure shoe.

The popularity of sneakers continued to grow in athletics, and by the 1950's, this form of sports-wear began spilling over into street and casual wear. Sneakers were the perfect counterculture fashion; unlike more formal shoes, they were cheap, barely required any upkeep, and most importantly, were considered offensive to societal standards when worn off the field. Stars, such as Marlon Brando and James Dean, frequently wore them in films to cultivate their characters' "outsider" status. Gradually though, as the 1950's went on, dress codes began to relax, and sneakers became much more ubiquitous. Whole families wore them, and in the following decades, sneakers became cemented as a casual closet staple.

By the 1980's, the sneaker began its climb from footwear basic to an iconic trend. It was during this decade that modern sneaker culture began. In 1984, Nike collaborated and released a line of basket-ball shoes with the then-rookie Chicago Bulls shooting guard, Michael Jordan. The Air Jordan 1 generated a lot of hype, and not only from its famous namesake. The original Jordan's featured a flashy red and black color way that differentiated him from the rest of the team; and was fully against NBA regulation. Every time Jordan stepped onto the court wearing his signature shoes, he would be fined \$5,000 (he wore them anyway, with Nike footing the bill each time). The story of this controversy, combined with Jordan's individuality and incomparable skills on the court fueled fan's excitement for the sneakers, and the Air Jordan became one of the most famed shoes in history.





Quickly after the Air Jordan, sneakers became immersed in the music industry as well. The shoes became closely associated with hip-hop. Run DMC's signature looks included almost head to toe Adidas gear, including footwear. In 1986, they released the single "My Adidas," leading to an endorsement deal with the brand. From then on, through the 90's and into the 2000's, sneaker brands and hip-hop artists collaborated frequently. Nike signed deals with Nelly and Wu-tang Clan, Reebok worked with 50 Cent, and Jay Z put out custom S. Carters under his own brand.

Today, many sneakers such as Converse and Air Jordans remain just as popular as they were when first released. However, there is still plenty of room for something new: high-end designer collaborations (such as Adidas and Yohji Yamamoto or Jeremy Scott) is yet another successful way brings more luxury into the already fashionable sneaker culture. Additionally, whether you love or hate Kanye West, it is undeniable that he has become a powerful player in the sneaker game. His Yeezy Boost 350's outdid Air Jordans for the first time in sales, and during his widely publicized deal with Nike, he helped draw attention to the issue of brands taking advantage of the athletes and artists in product promotion. Sneaker culture is still strong, and it will be interesting to see where it goes next.

#### What made you get into modeling?

I used to watch ANTM with my grandmother. You've walked with Khrystyana on #TheRealCatwalk in times square, What was that like? How did you feel?

So that wasn't my first time doing a catwalk but it was my first time walking in my underwear, walking in public, like wow im in front of times square. It's Crazy because that morning I almost didn't go, I was freaking out like omg my body looks horrible ugh this is a mess, my hair is weird. I went to a party the night before got drunk as fuck, I woke up like oh my god im not prepared for this. But my ex was like you did not spend a whole month prepping for this just to not go. I was like "its gon be too cold" I don't wanna do this. I got out there it wasn't even that cold and I was like you know what everyone out here probably has their own set of insecurities and I was just looking at all the girls, all the bodies out there, I was like I know I don't have my little ass out here freaking out when everybody is out here so brave and so bold and just accepting of themselves, it was just so beautiful, so liberating, such a great experience.





#### A lot of models today are very big on feminism and women empowerment, especially because for them it connects to the obstacles that they've been through in their career. What's your take on it? How do you feel?

I believe that we as girls do need to support each other a lot more. Just because there is so much going on in society that is stacking up against us, I mean we got these crazy abortion regulations, we got men telling us how we need to handle our bodies. It's disgusting, so when I hear girls talking shit on each other just like these men and being spiteful and hateful for reasons of insecurity or jealousy or whatever is just saddening to me. Honestly, we should be our biggest allies. We need to lift each other up more, we need to be patient with each other, and be more understanding.

#### Going back to what you said about the difficulty of getting signed by an agent and the stories of getting turned down, what are you gonna do to keep on moving forward?

I just know that I need to keep my portfolio in tip-top shape, so that means being very picky with the photographers that I work with or the creatives that I allow myself to work with because I know how I want to present myself. I think that's really key for models to understand. Always ask yourself "How are you trying to present yourself as a model? Not as a person. As a model." You wanna walk in the door and have people recognize that you model. You don't even have to say anything they can just feel it. I've had plenty of times where people in the street walk up to me and say "are you a model?" yes the fuck I am. "Are you signed?" No. That shocks them even more. So, going forward as an inspiring freelance model, im gonna continue doing the same thing im doing right now, and just elevate my pictures, elevate my wardrobe like, yo its a whole thing. You gotta work for this shit! it doesn't just come overnight.

#### Now that you're in a good space and you seem to know what path you're on, If you could say anything you want to all the people that ever doubted you in the past what would you say?

I'd tell them thank you. Thank you for saying all that bullshit. It inspired me to push even harder. I already wanted it and now you've just given me another reason to want it more.

#### What made you get into modeling?

Growing up I've always been slim but I wasn't tall, people always told me I should try modeling but I never wanted to, because im only like 5'4. My mom is really short, and my dad's family is really tall but I never got the tall side. I thought modeling was just about the really tall females, I used to watch America's next top model and Victorias Secret shows and that's all I saw. So I was very discouraged about the modeling idea until I got to college. My sophomore year, somebody saw me on Instagram and asked me if I wanted to do a photo shoot, and I said no I never did a photoshoot and im camera shy but he pushed me and my best friend pushed me to do it and that was my first photoshoot and after doing the shoot I realized that I really enjoyed being behind the camera. Me being camera shy forced me to tell a story through the camera and learn how to be in the moment. Getting into modeling, empowered me as a person.

#### What do you think the modeling industry needs more of and less of?

I think they need fewer rules because a lot of times I wanted to go to castings for runway it was always a minimum for females like height being 5'7 or 5'9. To me, it's a shame because theres so many talented models who are petite and the average female is about 5'5. These modeling agencies have so many rules like you have to be this thin and this tall, and you have to be this experienced. However, I do like that it is getting more diverse, im starting to see plus-sized and petite models more. I want the modeling world to focus less on looks and more on realism like how people really look in general.

#### With you being a model, what has been your biggest challenges so far?




#### How do you plan on pushing yourself as a model?

So my next goal is to walk NYFW. I've always done fashion shows in college and when I was walking the runway I remember feeling so overwhelmed and I would walk too fast or wouldn't pose. So I definitely need to do more runway. I also want to get into more video shoots, I've actually done 3 so far and I realized its completely different from taking pictures. You have to be in the moment, you have to know how to act, and it teaches you how to interact with other people while screening.

#### What's your biggest inspiration?

My biggest inspiration is my mom. My dad hasn't been there my entire life. There was a time where he had to leave for 10 years for personal reasons, so my mom raised us and she was very strict when I first told her I wanted to model. She's like no, I want you to go to school, which I get because she had to quit school because she had me and my brother really young around her early 20s. Raising us she got us stuck with the idea that school is everything. When I showed her my first beauty shoot she was so happy at the results that now she's been pushing me to model.







#### What made you get into modeling in the first place?

It was the comments I used to receive from outsiders led me to actual castings and auditions and actually putting myself out there. But I think if it wasn't for other people telling me their opinions and viewpoints, I think I would've never pushed myself as far as I am now. I probably would've liked the idea of being a model but never do anything about it. What made it a passion was watching ANTM and wearing my mom's heels walking up and down the hallways with my cousins and we would just act like models. My mom would put all of us in a line and say work it girls and we'd just walk behind each other.

#### How do you plan on pushing yourself as a model?

Because of my height, I think it would be best for me to become a catalog model because you can alter pictures to make a model look way different than what she is. So I was thinking that I can just take advantage of photos, do more shoots, and increasing my portfolio while working with different photographers from all over. All it takes is for one person to notice you and give you a boost. I also have plans of becoming an entrepreneur and naturalist.

#### A lot of models today are big on feminism today, what's your take on it?




#### There's tons of competition in this industry, in the future what's gonna make you stand out from other models?


If you can send an empowering message to women around the world, what would you say?


#### What about your weaknesses?

#### How do you plan on pushing yourself as a model?


